



BROWN V. BOARD AT 70

On May 17, 1954 the U.S. Supreme Court issued a decision in Brown v. Board of Education of Topeka, Kansas declaring that "separate educational facilities are inherently unequal" on the basis that it violated the 14th Amendment guaranteeing equal protection of the law. It remains a defining moment in U.S. History.

The late John Lewis was 14 in 1954. He recalls feeling hopeful for a better future when he learned of the Brown decision and often shared this optimism and conviction to work for justice. "When you see something that is not right, not fair, not just, we have a moral obligation, a mission and a mandate to do something, to say something, to speak up and speak out."
