The National Consortium for Teaching About East Asia (NSTA) invited us to screen and discuss <u>The Silent Witness</u> for a webinar of 50 educators. <u>True Justice: Bryan Stevenson's Fight for Equality</u> screened at the Hennepin County Adult Corrections Facility. In the evaluation, one resident shared. "I appreciate the story. Gives me a different outlook about things, especially things I didn't know about history and the South and how people were treated. I'm glad and happy you're free to tell your story. It needs to be heard by everyone."

The Brooklyn Rail, an independent forum for arts, culture, and politics throughout New York City and far beyond, hosted a virtual screening of *King in the Wilderness* in celebration of MLK Day. Over 290 attended!
